9		Lock Down	2021	24 x 16" 61 x 41 cm	Photograph on aluminum	The image shows how fear of COVID-19 creates a wall of isolation and quarantine. Cities, states and even countries have experienced pandemic-related lock downs. The errant virus is the opening society needs to defeat these microbes. Are locked-down people POWs? Cowards? Martyrs?
